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### Introduction

The Department of Social Work, Maulana Azad National Urdu University (MANUU), Hyderabad and National Association of Professional Social Workers in India (NAPSWI), New Delhi in collaboration with United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA), India organized the XI Indian Social Work Congress (XI ISWC) 2023 on the theme **"Leave No One Behind: Revisiting Pedagogy and Practice of Social Work in India"** from 3-5 November 2023. With its beginning in 2013 at the Department of Social Work, University of Delhi, ISWC has travelled through a number of social work institutions, cities and states. It was our great pleasure and honor that the NAPSWI decided to host the XI ISWC 2023 at MANUU.

In order to uphold the global commitment of 'Leave No One Behind' (LNOB) and fulfill the pledge and dedication of the social work profession to this global initiative, there was a need to relook and revisit its current pedagogy and practices. In this endeavor following sub themes had been identified for the XI ISWC 2023:

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


Figure 2: Participant, Speakers and Events in the XI ISWC 2023



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### State wise number of Educational Institutions and Participants in IX ISWC 2023




Figure 3: Participation of Institutions and Individuals across the Country

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### **Conference Highlights**

Eighteen (18) Parallel Technical Sessions were scheduled in which about two hundred twenty seven (227) research papers were presented. Further, two Workshops: Innovative Pedagogy in Social Work Education: Emphasizing Experiential Learning, Blended Methodologies, and AI- driven Possibilities for Outcome-Based Skill Development by Dr. Anish K.R., Rajagiri College of Social Sciences, Kerala; and Social Work and Spirituality by Prof. Suresh Pathare, CSRD, Ahmednagar, Maharashtra were conducted. A Round Table Discussion on the theme: Global and National Mandates: Revisiting Social Work Curriculum was organized. It was chaired and co-chaired by Prof. Zubair Meenai from Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi and Dr. Nilesh Deshpande, UNFPA, respectively. Another Round Table Discussion on the theme: Revisiting NAPSWI Definition of Social Work was chaired by Prof. P.K. Shajahan, TISS, Mumbai. The Keynote Address of the Conference was delivered by Prof S.M. Sajid from Jamia Millia Islamia on the theme 'Social Work Curriculum and Pedagogy: Challenges in Contemporary Times'. By setting the tone of the conference, he highlighted the changes and challenges in the new millennium before the social work profession and advocated to redefine its pedagogical contents and practicing approach.

### **Inaugural Session**

Formally, the conference began with the welcome note by Prof. Mohd Shahid, Organizing Secretary, XI ISWC 2023 in the inaugural session. He emphasized on the importance of teamwork which led to the emergence of the theme of the congress i.e. LNOB which also corroborates with the mandate of our university to reach to the unreached. Prof. R.P. Dwivedi,

President, NAPSWI thanked the Vice Chancellor MANUU for holding the XI ISWC 2023. Prof. Sanjai Bhatt, Conference Advisor and Immediate Past President NAPSWI explained in detail the very idea of initiating the Indian Social Work Congress way back in 2012. Dr. Sunitha Krishnan, Co-founder- *Prajwala*, Hyderabad, talked for those who are left behind and expressed deep concern about the attitude of the society towards the victim of sex trafficking mentioning it as a fast-growing



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organized crime against women and children. In search of the answer to such problems, she urged to create a laboratory of possibilities to see what works to change the situation.

Dr. Amir Afaque Ahmad Faizi, Joint Secretary cum Director, Minority Welfare Department, Govt of Bihar highlighted the importance of partnership with the UNFPA in running the Madrasa Project in Bihar and how its components fit the theme of this congress LNOB: Revisiting Pedagogy and Practice of Social Work in India.

Haridass, Mr. Sriram Deputy Representative, UNFPA India and chief guest of the inaugural session, while addressing the audience reaffirmed the motto of the UNFPA - every pregnancy is wanted, safe birth of every child and every young person's potential fulfilled and said that the motto of the UNFPA is the central to theme of this congress. Also, mentioned the

completion of fifty years (50) partnership with the Government of India (GoI). By this, XI ISWC 2023 becomes a platform for tri-folded celebrations where ISWC completed a decade, MANUU is celebrating its silver jubilee and UNFPA is tied with the GoI for the last fifty years. Prof. Syed Ainul Hasan, Vice Chancellor, MANUU, in his presidential remarks, reminded and reaffirmed the mandates of this university providing higher education through Urdu medium and

promoting women education and expressed his deep satisfaction of enrolling the students from marginalized sections of the society having Urdu background with the male – female ration of 60:40 and hopeful to bridge this gap in time to come reaching to the 50:50 ratio. Towards the end, he



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expressed that the combine efforts of NAPSWI, MANUU and UNFPA may do wonders for the motto LNOB.

In the mid of this inaugural session a historic and sustainable partnership between MANUU and UNFPA was announced to start a certificate course on **'Youth for Peace and Development'** and this is unveiled by Mr. Sriram Haridass and Prof. Syed Ainul Hasan in presence of other dignitaries on the stage. India having the largest youth population in the world as demographic dividend, this initiative is meant to provide a venue to 'unleash and unlock the potential of the youth and youth power to advance India'. Also, it will be helpful in the furtherance of the SDGs and National Youth Policy 2021 which articulate a ten-year vision for youth development that India seeks to achieve by 2030.

### **Keynote Address**

The keynote address was delivered by Prof. S M Sajid, former professor and Pro Vice Chancellor of Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi. In his keynote address, he highlighted the changes and challenges in the new millennium before the social work profession and advocated to redefine its pedagogical contents and practicing approach and set the tone of the conference.



### **Plenary/Special Sessions**

To speak in the plenary sessions, distinguished speakers were invited across the schools of social work and from the fields who are practicing social work. In the first two plenary sessions, the sub-theme was on 'Social Work Pedagogy and Pedagogical Challenges' where Prof. Murli Desai, Dr. Ajit Kumar, Prof. Zubair Meenai, Prof. Avatthi Ramaiah, Prof. Neera Agnimitra, Prof. Bipin Jojo, Prof. P.K. Shajahan and Dr. Farrukh Faheem deliberated on the different aspects of the theme. Both the sessions were moderated by Prof. Neera Agnimitra and Dr. Ajit Kumar respectively. In the next two sessions the sub – theme was on 'Youth Interventions in Institutional and Community Settings' where Prof. Neelam Sukhramani, Mr. Sandeep Chachra, Ms. Keerti, Mr. Sunil Jacob, Dr, Syed Hubbe Ali, Ms. Naghma Abidi, Mr. Ovais Sultan Khan, Prof. R. Nalini, Prof. Seema Sharma, Prof. Neena Pandey, Prof. Shahin Sultana, Mr. Kumar Manish, Ms. Amrita Goswami, Mr. Dawood Alam and Dr.



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Namami Sharma took part and talked in and around the said theme. These sessions were moderated by Dr. Amir Afaque Ahmad Faizi and Prof. Bipin Jojo respectively. The last plenary/special session was on 'From Social Work Curriculum to Practice' where Prof. Vijay Raghavan, Dr. Saumya, Dr. Pushpanjali Jha, Dr. Bhat Iqball Majeed, Dr. Manoj Joseph, Dr. Varun Sharma, Dr. Iftekhar Alam and Dr. Syed Ghufran Hashmi presented their papers. Dr. Farrukh Faheem has chaired the session.

Under the plenary 'Social Work Pedagogy and Pedagogical Challenges' a total of nine speakers expressed their views on different aspects of pedagogy. Prof. Desai narrated her own trajectory of experimenting with the social work pedagogy with the aim to improve the quality of social work curriculum planning and pedagogy.

To her, for the profession to grow, there is a need to develop system of research, writing and sharing with each other to make pedagogy a dynamic exercise. Dr. Ajit Kumar, in his talk, discussed two challenges before the Indian social work. The first was posed by the voluntary sector and the second by the American influence on Indian social work curriculum. Further, he expressed that the Indian social work resolved these issues and progress towards professionalization by producing large number of social work educators and expansion of voluntary sector after the economic reforms. Prof. Zubair Meenai, talked on deconstructing decolonization of social work education in India and expressed that



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by adopting the western model of social work the serious disconnect is found between universal ideas and situation in India. He said that in order to respond to local situations, a serious exercise is needed to be carried out to decolonize social work knowledge, values and practice. Prof. Avatthi Ramaiah tried to give answer to the question why we need to revisit the pedagogy and practice of social work to achieve the motto LNOB. Prof. Neera Agnimitra, discussed on community and community practice and with a notion that no one should be left behind. She deliberated on the importance of dialectics and participation of community in their development and empowerment. Prof. Bipin Jojo talked on Indigenous Knowledge and Social Work Education and Practice in India. He expressed that in given contexts and paradigms of Western hegemony and dominance in representing social work knowledge base and hierarchy of superior and inferior knowledge and argued on the need of indigenous knowledge and practice. Prof. Manish Jha spoke on Social Policy and Practice in Social Work: History, Reality and Relevance. In light of the mandate of social work engagement with the policy and welfare provisions, he presented the contemporary milieu of social policy and practice and how social work curricula should engage at different levels of welfare provisions. Prof. P.K. Shajahan delivered his lecture on Localizing SDGs through Research and Action: Social Work Responses for an equitable Society. To him, Localization of SDGs essentially means that the global aspirations need to be aligned with local realities and tailoring strategies to address the specific needs and aspirations of local communities. And this could be the way forward to ensure that the fruits of progress and development reach to the communities or groups who are left behind. Dr. Farrukh Faheem talked on Call for Indigenizing Social Work in India: Decolonization Quest or Push for Localism? In his talk he furthers the argument or debate on Foreign Vs Local origins of Social Work Profession.

In the second plenary session, **Youth Interventions in Institutional and Community Settings,** there were fifteen (15) speakers who discussed and deliberated around youth and their development. This whole session echoed engagement with youth in social work education and practice. The speakers dwelled on issues like social work, role of the youth collectives, the power of listening to foster global fraternity through social work education, social and individual change by reimagining the pedagogy, school social work practice for enhancing school well-being; need to revisit community organization by revisiting archives to use such archives in classroom transaction and fieldwork. In the last plenary session, **'From Social Work Curriculum to Practice'** there were eight speakers who deliberated on the topics including criminal justice social work, alignment of New Education Policy (NEP) and Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in social work education, theorizing social work knowledge for social work education and practice in India, examining social work curriculum by the lens of disability studies, revisiting the group work method from the angle of informal nature of groups and the importance of language and communication in case work and client – worker relationship.



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### **Parallel Technical Sessions**

The technical sessions were divided into five sub- themes of the congress and a total of 225 papers were presented. First was the 'Social Work Curriculum: Pedagogy and Pedagogical Challenges' in which forty-two (42) presenters presented their papers. The second was on the 'Sustainable Interventions with Adolescent and Youth' in which thirty-seven (37) presentations were done. In the third category 'Intervention Models with Rural Urban and Tribal Communities' a total of forty-two (42) presentations were presented by the presenters. In the fourth sub – theme 'Marginality and Working with Marginalized Groups' there were seventy-seven (77) got presented their papers and in the sub – theme fifth 'Innovations in Social Work Practice and Research' a total of twenty seven (27) presenters presented their papers.

### **Interviews of Social Work Educators**

Apart from these, thirteen (13) eminent social work educators were interviewed, and videos were

recorded. The themes of the interviews include contemporary challenges of social work education, research and practice in India; role of social innovations in social work education and practice; relevance of looking into history of social work in India; strengthening field work practicum; human rights and minorities in India; Indian social work and its trends; inclusion of Dalits and minorities in social work curriculum; challenges of social work pedagogy and practice in India; and other themes in and around social work pedagogy and practice.

### **Pre – Conference Lectures**

In addition, three Pre – conference lectures were recorded where Prof. Brij Mohan from Louisiana State University, USA; Dr. Paul Michael Garrett from University of Galway, Ireland; and Dr. Kris Clarke from University of Helsinki, Finland were invited online.





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Prof. Brij Mohan, a recipient of first doctoral degree in social work from non-western world talked on the topic 'Pedagogy and Social Practice'. He started with that as social work marches for the egalitarian future, confounded by barriers and challenges of the faltering social institution, a radical approach is to be adopted. Further, he said that in order to rebuild a society, need to have a system having coherent values and not extremist political and religious fundamental views but certain secular, universal and civil values which help to achieve civility which is needed to combat forces of darkness. Continuation to this, the second lecture was on 'A Note on Dissenting Social Work and the Destabilisation of Common Sense' by Dr. Garrett who started by praising the idea expressed in the conference brochure 'pedagogy of the question rather than the answer' which itself conveyed and capture the critical vibes of the conference. As social work talks about safeguarding and promoting the human rights and considers it as a core value, then the social workers must possess the appropriate ideology, opinion, and perspective, otherwise become unfit for the purpose of the social work profession.

In this line, the third lecture was on **'Decolonizing Social Work in a World in Flames'** by Dr. Kris Clarke. In her lecture she highlighted three aspects: structural social work; why colonization is relevant to talk about; and what de-colonization can do in developing our own practice to serve the respective public or social order. The prime of the social work is to deal with the issues arising out of structure or colonization.




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### Lifetime Achievement Awards

Billore, Former Professor, Indore School of Social Work. NAPSWI also conferred the Young Achiever Award to Ms. Sachi Singh, founder Ehsaas, Lucknow.

The best paper awards were conferred to five research scholars/students based on rigorous review (blind review). They are: Mr. Vishal Mishra, Research Scholar, Dept of Social Work, University of Delhi; Ms. Athira. V. H, Research Scholar, Dept of Social Work, Pondicherry University; Ms. Rosna Vincent, Research Scholar, Department of Social Work, Pondicherry University; Ms. Sumaya Rashid Rather Research Scholar, University of Kashmir; and Ms. Abhinaya R, Research Scholar, Department

of Social Work, Sree Saraswathi Thyagaraja College, Coimbatore.

Raising concern about the social work by saying that the social workers have energy, courage, knowledge, and skills but not being mainstreamed yet and that can be unturned by utilizing the knowledge gained through fieldwork by developing partnership with other professional.

Prof Surinder Jaswal, TISS, Mumbai started her valedictory address by praising the success of the conference which reached to the pinnacle. She said that we are living in a fracturing world with growing polarization and global and domestic inequalities, politics of exclusion, where merely providing services will not lead us at par of the need we are looking to address. There is need to see the world in totality and serve it by meeting the humanitarian needs, supporting resilience, and



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building long term capacity of effecting population. The chief guest of the valedictory session, Dr. Nilesh Deshpande, Program Specialist, UNFPA India, being a key figure in partnership with MANUU, expressed his deep satisfaction to work with MANUU and NAPSWI. To him, social work professionals are the backbone of development, and they must take pride of this profession. Further, he has given a lesson that if social work professionals will not take pride for their profession, no one else have pride for you. Prof. Shugufta Shaheen, OSD – I, in her presidential remarks said that the social work is everybody's domain and all streams especially the humanities and languages can contribute to the purpose, the social work profession thrives to achieve. The valedictory session come to an end with the vote of thanks by Prof. Mohd Shahid, Organizing secretary, XI ISWC 2023.

By this conglomeration, we reaffirmed our commitment with a single garment of destiny to achieve social justice and human wellbeing.
